Red Hook Farms, a project of Red Hook Initiative, is a youth-centered urban farming and food justice program in Red Hook, Brooklyn that creates opportunities for local teens to expand their knowledge base, develop their leadership skills, and positively engage with each other, their community, and the environment.

Since 2001, we have operated 2 urban farm sites: the 2.75 acre Columbia Street Farm and the 1.1 acre NYCHA Red Hook Houses Farm (aka the Wolcott Street Farm). Our programs include a youth farm apprenticeship, weekly farm stands, a CSA farm share, a school workshop program, a community composting operation, and a Garden Club for NYCHA residents. We strive to improve access to healthy, affordable produce while nurturing a new generation of green leaders on community land we steward with care, integrity, and intention.

The 2024 season was a robust year at the farms! Our education programs and produce distributions were fresh and full: cooking demonstrations alongside produce giveaways at Wolcott farm, youth farmers leading volunteers at Columbia farm, school groups exploring compost piles, and volunteers in every corner. Amidst this thriving constellation of programs, we embarked on 2 reimagined endeavors to further our food access, education, and conservation work: the Food as Medicine program and our Community Compost Operation.

As always, Red Hook Farms offers a space for community members to breathe fresh air and access healthy produce in a meaningful and joyful way. We take our role as land stewards with weight and honor, paying respect to the Lenape stewards who came before as well as present now.



Growing for our Community

With thousands of pounds of produce coming off the fields, we had plenty of ways to get those veggies to the kitchens of our community!

At the free Friday Farm Stand at Wolcott Farm, we distributed more than 6,000 pounds of produce to NYCHA Red Hook Houses residents, while also hosting 57 live cooking demonstrations that showcased how to prepare seasonal, just-picked ingredients.

At the Columbia farm, our Saturday farm stand offered sliding-scale pricing for over 1,600 market visitors. Among those visitors were participants of our newly launched Food as Medicine program! In partnership with NYU Family Health Center, the Red Hook Community Health Network, and RHI's Community Building team, we offered 30 food-insecure families a weekly \$25 voucher to spend on farm-grown produce, as well as fruit and eggs we purchased from other local farms. As a result of the program, 92% of participants reported eating more fruits and vegetables and 100% tried a new fruit or vegetable!

Finally, our CSA is still going strong after more than 20 years in operation, with 40 members from in and around Red Hook.

Growing the Next Generation

25 youth farmers joyfully farmed over the 2024 season, harvesting garlic, planting the fields and raised beds at both farms, and traveling to conferences around the city. They attended Making Brooklyn Bloom at the Brooklyn Botanic Garden—where our Farm Director, Saara, also presented—along with GreenThumb's GrowTogether Conference and the Youth Food Justice Network Summit at East NY Farms. Their pepper sauces and body butters were peak farm alchemy last year!

Our littlest farmers came from schools around Red Hook and beyond to talk bugs, explore the fields, and taste farm specialties like lemon sorrel, garlic chives, and strawberries! In 2024, we were able to offer visits to PS 15, PS 676/Harbor Middle School, PAVE, and South Brooklyn Community High School.

Community Compost Operation

For the first time ever, we received direct funding from NYC Council to run the compost operation at the Columbia Street Farm, which was formerly run through partnerships with other organizations. Taking on full management has allowed the team to train our youth farmers in compost best practices and work closely with volunteers and Master Composters to manage the compost piles! We now collect food scraps from community members 24/7 through accessible bins at the gates, and give back finished compost to community gardeners, while nourishing the farm soil to grow even more nutrient-dense produce for the community.

15,909 pounds of food scraps diverted from the landfill and turned into compost

105 community members received free compost for their gardens





Welcoming Volunteers

A key ingredient to the farm mix is our incredible community of volunteers! From the greenest first-timers to the seasoned returners, this eager band of merry farmers are always ready to weed through forests, mix soupy food scraps, or harvest itchy okra. They bring the best vibes and we are so very grateful for their constant love and labor!

5,106 hours of labor were donated by volunteers over 150 work sessions

Red Hook Houses Garden Club

A third of Wolcott farm is dedicated to the Garden Club, an ethnically-diverse group of resident farmers who grow their own vegetables, herbs, and flowers in 24 raised beds. We supported them with tools, seeds, and seedlings and they brought a celebration of creativity and eclectic invention as they trellised, terraced, and intercropped their way to a bountiful harvest.




